Key Concepts

- Constructive or Liberation theologies God calls us to see the context and oppression of our times, and to respond with love to strive for the Kingdom of God.
- The final promise of our Baptismal Covenant "To strive for justice and peace on the earth, and respect the dignity of every human being."
- Called to a radical love A love that breaks down all socially constructed barriers
- Why "Queer"?
 - Breaking down false binaries,
 - Breaking barriers of gender or sexuality.
 - o Breaking social, religious, traditional norms
- Love is Patient, kind... builds up, no longer male and female...
- Jesus Always breaking barriers, in the name of Love
- Queer theology
 - Seeks out queer perspectives, stories, witness
 - Seeks the queerness in scripture
 - Orients us toward what matters the most living the Love that Jesus proclaimed
